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Director's Note

Devising a piece of theatre with deaf performers from two different countries has, I'm told, rarely happened before, if at all. Thanks to support from the British Council, we have been able to prepare this piece of work in both Paris and Glasgow and will now perform it in both cities. These brilliant performers, Ramesh and Emmanuelle, have been a joy to work with, as have the rest of the company. *La Performance* is a totally devised piece of visual theatre which re-enacts some brief moments from French classic cinema. What develops in the rehearsal room becomes a look at the preparation to perform and the on-stage performance itself – exploring how much an actor inhabits the character to be played and how much some part of that actor's own personality can still linger during the show.

Biographies

Andy Arnold - Director

Andy became Artistic Director of Tron Theatre in 2008 following many years as Artistic Director of The Arches, a venue and theatre company he personally established in 1991. Productions Andy has staged for Tron Theatre Company include: *The Drawer Boy* by Michael Healey; the Scottish premiere of *That Face* by Polly Stenham; *Valhalla* by Paul Rudnick (UK premiere); world premieres of *Sea And Land And Sky* by Abigail Docherty; *Plume* by J.C. Marshall and Edwin Morgan's *Dreams and Other Nightmares* by Liz Lochhead.

More recently he directed John Byrne's Underwood Lane; his own adaptation of Shakespeare's The Tempest with an all-female cast; Gary McNair's adaptation of The Alchemist; Enda Walsh's Ballyturk; Martin McCormick's Ma, Pa and the Little Mouths; Stephen Adly Guirgis' The Motherfucker with the Hat; Anthony Neilson's The Lying Kind; Martin McDonagh's The Lonesome West; Peter Arnott's Shall Roger Casement Hang?; Megan Barker's adaptation of Ibsen's Ghosts; Samuel Beckett's Happy Days, starring Karen Dunbar; and the first stage production of James Joyce's Ulysses, adapted by Dermot Bolger, which toured to Ireland after its premiere at the Tron. Ulysses was revived in 2015 and invited to perform in four cities in China. While in China Andy also staged a devised piece with Chinese actors entitled A Journey Round James Joyce, translated into Mandarin, and returned to direct The Selfish Giant for Beijing Children's Theatre Company. During lockdown, Andy devised and directed a promenade show, high man pen meander, for digital release as a tribute to the work of Edwin Morgan.

Andy has worked with Ramesh on previous shows including *Off Kilter* and *Ali The Magic Elf.* This is his first experience working with Emmanuelle Laborit and it has been a joy for the Tron to be collaborating with her amazing theatre in Paris, IVT.

Jenny Booth - Set Designe<mark>r</mark>

Jenny Booth is a freelance set designer and illustrator living and working in Glasgow. Her current work focuses on resourceful small-scale design with sustainability in mind. Recent work includes: *Me and My Sister Tell Each Other Everything* and *The Tempest* (Tron Theatre); *And Then Come the Nightjars* (Wonder Fools); and *Our Kitchen* (Standing Tall Arts/Scottish Refugee Council).

Victoria Brown - Costume Designer

Since graduating from Queen Margaret University, Edinburgh, Victoria has enjoyed being involved in numerous theatre, film and television productions, working with companies including BBC, ITV, Netflix, Discovery Channel, Scottish Opera and Scottish Ballet. Victoria has loved being part of the Tron Theatre creative family since 2015.

Benny Goodman - Lighting Designer

Benny Goodman is a freelance lighting designer and creative collaborator, based in Glasgow and London.

He has worked in theatres across the UK and Europe on a variety of projects and productions, and is a creative collaborator with theatre company, Wonder Fools.

Emmanuelle Laborit - 'Her'

Emmanuelle Laborit is an author, director and actress. She began acting at the age of 9 and has acted in productions by Ralph Robbins (*Voyage Au Bout Du Métro*); Thierry Roisin (*Antigone*, premiered at the Avignon Festival); Philippe Carbonneaux (*Pour Un Oui Ou Pour Un Non*); Marie Montegani (*King Lear*) and Jean-Claude Fall (*Parole Perdue*). Her role in *Les Enfants du Silence*, directed by Jean Dalric and Levent Beskardès, earned her the Molière for Theatrical Revelation in 1993. She has also worked with Barbara Nicollier (*Poèmes de Michaux*), Serge Hureau and Philippe Carbonneaux (*Inouï Music-Hall*) and Philippe Galant (*Monologues du Vagin*).

She has worked in films with Claude Lelouch (11".09'. 01 September 11), Christophe Schaub (Amour Secret), Mehdi Charef (Marie-Line), Pascal Baeumler (Retour à La Vie), Yves Angelo (Un Air Si Pur), Roberto Faenza (La Vie Silencieuse de Marianna Ucria), Caroline Link (Au-Delà du Silence), Felipe Vega (Le Toit du Monde), Ariane Mnouchkine (La Nuit Miraculeuse) and Avec Nos Yeux, a documentary film by Marion Aldighieri.

She published *Le Cri de la Mouette* (Robert Laffont), which has been translated into 14 languages and won the Prix Vérité. In parallel with her commitment to the recognition of French sign language (LSF), she took over the running of IVT - International Visual Theatre in 2003, and in January 2007 opened the first theatre in France dedicated to sign language, visual and body arts. She now co-directs IVT with Jennifer Lesage-David.

In 2011, she created *Héritages*, her first production, assisted by Estelle Savasta. She also participated in the French sign language adaptation of the show *Traversée*, directed by Estelle Savasta.

In 2013, she collaborated as author and actress in IVT's *Une sacrée boucherie*, created in collaboration with Pierre-Yves Chapalain as writer, and Philippe Carbonneaux as director.

She signed her second production in 2014 with the show *The Queen Mother*, an adaptation of the Snow White tale.

She worked on the creation of a theatrical reading in French sign language of the children's album *Le Prince Tigre*, by Chen Jiang Hong.

She returned to the stage in 2017 with *Dévaste-Moi*, a musical show directed by Johanny Bert.

Today she is directing *L'épopée d'Hermès*, with the aim of introducing his work to the modern world and passing it on to future generations.

Ramesh Meyyappan - 'Him'

Since Ramesh moved to Scotland in 2006, he has played an important role in raising awareness of the deaf community in the Scottish theatre sector. He has worked tirelessly to make his work mainstream and accessible to both deaf and hearing audiences. He was involved in the programme design team for BA Performance in BSL and English at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland, where he continues to teach the Visual Theatre module.

Over the years, his solo performances and collaborations have toured nationally and internationally (over 20 countries) to much critical acclaim. His work has been nominated five times for Best Actor at the Life! Theatre Awards (Singapore) and has been awarded this accolade twice. In Scotland he was nominated for a Total Theatre Award for *Snails and Ketchup* and for a CATS (Critics' Awards for Theatre in Scotland) for Best Male Performance in *Off Kilter*.

In recent years, his writing and directing has included: *Peter Pan* (Riksteatern Crea, Sweden), which toured over 40 shows throughout Sweden, Norway and France; an adaptation of Gogol's *The Overcoat* (Royal Conservatoire of Scotland), as part of their final showcase with BA Performance in BSL/English. Recently Ramesh devised *1971*, created with a company from Bangladesh with the support of British Council Bangladesh-UK (ongoing until 2023). He is currently working on a visual adaptation of the script for Shakespeare's *Macbeth* for a Canadian-based theatre company. He was recently part of the original cast for *Wonder Boy* (Bristol Old Vic), directed by Sally Cookson.

Ramesh is proud to be Associate Artist of the Tron Theatre and Raw Material. Ramesh is also a board member of Vanishing Point Theatre Company.

Ross Whyte - Composer/Performer

Ross Whyte is a Glasgow-based composer, sound artist and arranger. In 2012 he completed a practice-based PhD in Musical Composition at the University of Aberdeen where his field of research was concerned with impermanence in audio-visual intermedia and headphone-specific composition.

His compositional output often includes collaborations with artists of disciplines different from his own, including dance, theatre, film and the digital arts.

Since early 2016 he has worked as one half of the Gaelic ambient electronica duo, WHYTE with singer-songwriter Alasdair Whyte. The duo was awarded the Art and Culture trophy at the 2019 Scottish Gaelic Awards. They released their third album *MAIM* in March 2021, which was written as part of a collaborative theatre work of the same name with Theatre Gu Leòr. *MAIM* has received positive critical acclaim, international airplay and several award nominations, including a shortlist for Scottish Trad Album of the Year 2021.

He has recently received commissions from BBC Alba, Sound Festival, Theatre Gu Leòr, National Theatre of Scotland, Art Walk Porty Festival and Ceòl is Craic.

Ross is currently working on a new solo album.

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IVT – International Visual Theatre, Paris

In 2007, IVT opened the first theatre building in France dedicated to sign language, visual and body arts. Nestled in the heart of Paris, in Pigalle, IVT is managed by Emmanuelle Laborit and Jennifer Lesage-David. It is a space for exchange, meeting and discovery for the deaf and the hearing, bringing together a theatre, a training centre and a publishing house. In the forty five years that IVT has been in existence, it has become the leading venue for the diffusion and creation of bilingual sign language, visual and physical theatre.

Each season IVT hosts around fifteen shows, around ten themed evenings (screenings, conferences and meetings) and several creative residencies. Half of the projects are bilingual LSF - French shows and half are visual shows (without words). The invited companies come from all over France and from Europe. All work presented is aimed at everyone, deaf and hearing audiences

IVT is supported by the French Ministry of Culture (Direction Régionale des Affaires Culturelles d'Ile-de-France; Délégation Générale à la Langue Française et aux Langues de France), by the city of Paris and by the Region Île-de-France. La Performance is supported by The French Institute and the City of Paris.



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
